MEC Masina Encourages Grade 12 Learners to Strive for Excellence



he MEC for Education, Ms. Lindi Masina, addressed Grade 12 learners from the Dr. Pixley Ka Isaka Seme Local Municipality this morning as part of the Provincial Executive Council Outreach Programme.

In her remarks, MEC Masina called on learners to rise to the challenge and dedicate themselves to making 2025 a year of excellence. She emphasized that education is the key to transforming lives, strengthening communities, and securing the future of Mpumalanga—the Place of the Rising Sun.

Highlighting the province's achievements, she noted that Mpumalanga attained an overall pass rate of 84.9% in 2024, while Gert Sibande District achieved 87.7%.

HIKING WITH PURPOSE

With the bright, amazing Danisile Mathebula

Please tell us a bit about yourself — who you are and what you do

My name is Danisile Mathebula. I work in the Department of Education, where I contribute to research and policy that supports sustainable development. Outside of work, I'm passionate about hiking, which I do part-time as a platform to drive social change, especially in underresourced communities.

When did your love for hiking begin, and what inspired you to start?

My love for hiking started as a way to relieve stress and reconnect with nature. Over time, it became more than just a personal outlet — it became a space where I could reflect, grow, and eventually give back. Focus on improving not proving anything while hiking or trekking the trails

You've combined hiking with doing good

in the community. What inspired you to link your hikes with charitable causes?

I realized I could use the hiking journeys not only for my own well-being but to raise awareness and resources for meaningful causes. It felt natural to connect my love for hiking with something bigger — helping young girls stay in school and supporting communities that often go unseen.

Can you tell us about some of the projects you've been involved in, especially those focused on raising funds or buying sanitary pads for young girls?

One key initiative I've been part of involves collecting and distributing sanitary pads to schools in disadvantaged areas. Through donations raised during our hikes and support from kind-hearted individuals, we've been able to make a small but meaningful difference in the lives of young girls.

What has been the most memorable or touching moment during one of your charity hikes?

One day, after contributing nicely used clothes, sanitary pads and toiletries to a community in Eswatini celebrating my birthday in August 2024, a young girl with a 6-month child cried and said my daughter will be warm tonight. One young girl walked up to me and said, "Now I won't have to stay home during that time of the month." That moment really hit home, reminded me that dignity is a right, not a luxury.

What challenges have you faced in doing this kind of work, and how have you overcome them?

Recognising God grace, seeking his guidance through prayer, fasting and maintaining faith. Balancing time between work and hiking initiatives can be tough, but planning ahead and building a supportive network has made it manageable. Resources are also a challenge, but I've learned to keep pushing, even small donation or action can lead to big impact.

Why is this cause, especially helping young girls with access to sanitary products, so close to your heart?

Because I've seen and experienced first-hand how the lack of such basic items (sanitary pads) can strip away confidence and opportunity to attend school as younger girl. Every girl deserves to feel secure, clean, and focused on her education — not worried about hygiene.

How do you prepare for your hikes, both physically and mentally?

I stay active throughout the week jogging three times a week and try to eat healthy. Mentally, I always engage on reading, meditate on scriptures, fasting and pray for guidance, I also focus on the purpose behind each hike — knowing that each step can make a difference gives me strength and motivation.



What would you say to someone who wants to get involved, either in hiking or in community projects like yours?

Start small. Join a hike, donate where you can, or volunteer your time. You don't need to have all the answers — just a willingness to care and take action.

Do you have any upcoming hikes or initiatives you're excited about that we should know of?

Yes! We're planning a hike in celebration of Women's Month in August and trekking challenging hike in the Drakensberg 4 days circular hike, with the aim of collecting sanitary pads and school supplies for two rural schools. It's going to be a beautiful combination of nature, purpose, and unity.

Lastly, what does this work mean to you personally, and what legacy do you hope to leave behind?

It means everything. This work is part of what God placed in my heart and living a purpose filled life. I want to be remembered as someone who turned her passion, fears and failures into purpose and used her journey — both in nature and life — to uplift others especially young girls and women.

new orbit as she reminds them "enmity" is a two-way street.

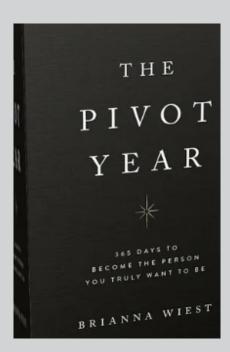
