International Literacy Day

September 8 was proclaimed International Literacy Day by UNESCO on November 17, 1965. It was first celebrated in 1966. Its aim is to highlight the importance of literacy to individuals, communities and societies. On International Literacy Day each year, UNESCO and all UN member states reminds the international community of the status of literacy and adult learning globally. Celebrations take place around the world.

According to UNESCO, South Africa has 94.3% literacy rate for all citizens with 95.5% males and 93.1% females leading to a gender difference of 2.4%. This might be greatly influenced by government's launch of the Kha Ri Gude Mass Literacy Campaign in February 2008, with the intention of enabling 4,7 million adults above the age of 15 years to become literate and numerate in one of the eleven official languages. Achieving this goal will enable South Africa to reach its UN: Education For All commitment made at Dakar in 2000 - that of halving the country's illiteracy rates by 2015.

The South African Government regards literacy, both reading and writing as a basic human

right leading to the empowerment of an individual towards self actualisation contributing to the betterment of society. Fortunate as we are, Government has noted that our people are not reading as they should.

Government then mandated the Department of Basic Education, through the provincial education departments to do something to address this, hence the Drop All and Read Campaign which is driven in pursuit of realising our long term goal. This programme focuses on Grades R and 1 calling on teachers to read and tell stories for half an hour each day.

The MEC for Education, Mrs. Reginah Mhaule appealed to teachers and parents to heed the call to drop all and read. To that effect, she said, "The formal teaching of reading skills by schools is crucial, but learners learn to read well and with understanding by reading. The more they read with enjoyment, the better their reading becomes. Children need support and encouragement to discover the pleasure of reading and to become lifelong readers and learners.

Reading for pleasure develops vocabulary, complex language structures, general knowledge and a wider frame of reference. Krashen in his influential book, The power of reading summarises the extensive research which has confirmed the positive results of free voluntary reading for learners' reading performance and other measures of literacy in first and additional languages."

As part of the campaign to promote literacy, members of the public and organisations are encouraged to donate books and suitable magazines to schools.

A person does not have to be a teacher or a librarian to help ensure that the library is open outside of school hours, cover books, paste in date sheets and book pockets, keep the library tidy or even issue and return books.

Members of the community can also volunteer to read or tell stories to learners in schools. It is very important that adults in the community serve as reading role models.

We are looking forward to working together for a successful nation









The school caters for grade R to Grade 6 and has 12 classrooms, 02 flushing toilets, 08 enviroloos, an admin block, a library and a kitchen. The overall enrollment is 357 learners.

he month of July is widely referred to as the Mandela Month and on 19 July 2015 at Cyril Clarke secondary School in Mbombela, the Mpumalanga Department of Education welcomed home Messrs. Richard Mabaso, Sibusiso Vilane and the entire South African entourage who had undertaken the trek.

Sibusiso Vilane and Richard Mabaso established the Trek4Mandela project to raise funds for the Caring4Girls initiative which supports needy girls with sanitary towels whilst at the same time teaching girls about puberty and adolescence stages in an effort to mitigate the adverse effects which research has shown that a girl could miss up to 50 days of school per year due to menstrual challenges.

This year's third annual Trek4Mandela, themed; Take Action Inspire Change; took place in July leading to a drive-and-climb from South Africa through SADC countries that played a big role in the liberation of South Africa i.e. Botswana, Zambia and Tanzania and the summiting of Mount Kilimanjaro on Mandela Day in 18 July, Mandela's birthday.

To date, the Caring4Girls an initiative of Imbumba Foundation, endorsed by the MEC for Education, Mrs. Reginah Mhaule has reached and touched the lives of over 10,000 girls, distributed over 130,000 packets of much needed sanitary pads since 2012. The initiative, supported by the national Minister of Basic Education, Mrs. Angie Motshekga, has also integrated with Teach Children to Save South Africa of The Banking Association South Africa, partnered with Lil-lets We are Women as well as integrated with the Umkhosi wo Mhlanga (Zulu Royal Reed dance) to support over 30,000 girls.

Addressing the gathering, the MEC for Education, Mrs. Reginah Mhaule said, "As we welcome you today, we are not alone but stand hand in glove with the sons and daughters of the Place of the rising sun equally saluting and paying homage to you for your courage and accomplishments.

Counting Made Easy

he Mpumalanga Department of Education is making strides to increase the number of learners who take and pass Mathematics and Physical Science in the province and to improve the capacity of teachers who are teaching these subjects.

The Department has established the Maths, Science and Technology Academy to spearhead this drive and to date there are 101 secondary schools that are offering these subjects compulsory to grade 10 to 12 learners.

These 101 secondary schools are resourced with state of the art equipment to instill interest amongst the learners and to ensure that an enabling environment is created for the attainment of the departmental above mentioned goal.

Of significant is that the province has already established a Mathematics, Science and Technology Academy (MSTA) that will help to facilitate the teaching and learning of these subjects, conduct research and capacitate teachers on an ongoing basis.

This Academy is located at Emalahleni Local Municipality and is liked to four sub hubs, one in each district to facilitate the live broadcast of these subjects.

Bohlabala District sub hub is Acorn to Oaks Secondary school, Ehlanzeni District sub hub is Khumbula Secondary school, Gert Sibande District sub hub is Izimbali Boarding school while for Nkangala District the sub hub is Kwandebele Science school.

Each sub hub will have laboratories, a Media Centre and a Broadcast Centre. The 101 MSTA Schools will be connected as hop/relay sites with computer laboratories.

At the occasion of the announcement of the 2015 grade 12 results the MEC for education Mrs. Reginah Mhaule said:

"It gives me pleasure to announce that all systems are now in place to ensure that the 101 designated schools in the province will from 2016 onwards offer Mathematics and Physical Science from Grades 10 to 12 as compulsory subjects to all learners.

These schools will be supported through the already established Maths, Science and Technology Academy that is located at Emalahleni Local Municipality.

Teachers have been trained and the required infrastructure has been installed in these schools and to their primary feeder schools. We will

continue resourcing them so that they attain the highest levels of technology enhanced teaching."

Furthermore the MEC said in relation to the performance of learners in Mathematics and Physical Science in 2015:

"We are encouraged that in 2015, there were more learners who wrote and passed Mathematics and Physical Science. 11 441 learners representing 55,5% and 10 981 learners representing 62.6% passed Mathematics and Physical Science respectively. This means 1 391 more learners for Mathematics and 2 060 more learners passing Physical Science than in 2014. This is commendable.

Again, ten schools were able to pass 50 and more learners at 50% and above in Mathematics and Seven Schools were able to pass 50 and more learners at 50% and above."

This is clear evidence that if we were to work hard the numbers of learners taking and passing these subjects can be tripled before 2019.

Given the kind of support that the learners in the 101 MSTA schools will enjoy this time around ,it is expected that Mpumalanga Province will be amongst the leading provinces when the 2016 Grade 12 results are announced.

The Department is fully aware that parents and communities in general have an important role to play to demystify the perception that these are difficult subjects.

Communities are required to embrace the idea and to appreciate that these subjects are the key towards their growth and development.

They need to support their children and to refrain from sending confusing messages.


There must be a common community narrative that propels children to do well in Mathematics and Physical science.
